Why Hit-and-Run Bicycle Crashes Are So Common in Georgia

In cities like Atlanta, Marietta, and Duluth — and on rural highways across the state — cyclists share the road with drivers who aren't always paying attention. Some of these drivers make a bad situation worse by panicking and fleeing the scene.

Common reasons drivers flee after hitting a cyclist include:

- They don't have insurance or a valid license
- They were drinking, texting, or driving distracted
- They're afraid of being arrested or sued
- They simply panic and try to avoid consequences

But no matter the reason, leaving the scene of a crash is a crime in Georgia. Under O.C.G.A. § 40-6-270, drivers are legally required to stop and provide assistance. Failing to do so can result in jail time, fines, and civil liability.

When a driver leaves the scene, the steps you take next can make or break your case. Even if you're shaken, injured, or unsure what just happened, here's what you should try to do — or ask someone nearby to help:

- **Call 911 immediately**. Report the crash and request medical help. Let the dispatcher know it was a hit-and-run and give as much detail as possible.
- **Get medical attention**. You may have serious injuries that aren't immediately obvious. Prompt treatment also creates a clear record for your case.
- Write down everything you remember. Include details like the vehicle's color, make, license plate digits (even partial), direction of travel, and the driver's appearance.

- Talk to witnesses. Get names and contact info. Ask what they saw and if they have dashcam or phone video.
- **Take photos**. Capture the scene, your damaged bike, visible injuries, and any debris or tire marks.
- **File a police report**. Make sure officers document the hit-and-run properly. Your attorney can help you amend or supplement it if details are missing.

Even if you never find the driver, these actions help protect your rights and lay the groundwork for an uninsured motorist (UM) claim.

How Uninsured Motorist Coverage Can Help in a Hit-and-Run

Many Georgia residents don't realize that their own car insurance can cover them in a bicycle crash — even if they weren't driving. If you have UM coverage, it may apply when:

- The driver is never identified
- The driver has no insurance
- The driver is known but flees and can't be located for a liability claim

UM policies are designed to step in when you're injured by someone who can't be held directly accountable. They can help cover:

- Medical bills
- Lost wages
- Pain and suffering
- Permanent disability
- Future care and support
