Why FedEx Truck Accidents Often Cause Severe Injuries

FedEx operates several types of delivery trucks in Georgia. FedEx drivers are under enormous pressure to meet strict delivery timelines. They may cut corners by <u>driving distracted</u>, skipping breaks to stay on schedule, or failing to <u>properly secure loads</u> that later shift and cause accidents. Some drivers are inexperienced with large trucks, making errors in judgment that smaller car drivers rarely face.

Because of the size and weight difference, even a lower-speed crash with a FedEx truck can cause catastrophic injuries that lead to long-term medical needs, lost earning capacity, and changes in nearly every part of daily life.

FedEx's Legal Responsibility After a Truck Accident

FedEx delivery truck crashes are not handled the same way as collisions between two passenger cars. Under Georgia law, employers like FedEx can be held liable for the careless actions of their drivers if they were working at the time of the crash. This means if a FedEx driver runs a red light or rear-ends your car while making deliveries, you can pursue a claim against the company itself.

FedEx also has its own fleet maintenance divisions. If a crash happens because of <u>faulty brakes</u> or <u>worn tires</u> that should have been replaced, FedEx can be held responsible for failing to keep its trucks safe.

Unlike a private driver with limited insurance coverage, FedEx typically carries large commercial liability policies. This might sound like good news because there should be more money available to cover serious injuries. The reality is these large insurers aggressively defend claims to protect their bottom line. They may deny responsibility outright, try to blame you, or make low settlement offers hoping you'll accept far less than what your injuries are actually worth.

What Makes FedEx Truck Accident Cases So Complex?

More Parties May Be Involved

FedEx often contracts work out to independent drivers or smaller trucking companies. This means your claim could involve multiple parties beyond just FedEx and its insurer. There might be a subcontractor, a separate maintenance provider, or even a parts manufacturer if a mechanical defect contributed to the crash. Tracking down who is actually responsible requires an experienced legal team that knows how to identify all potential sources of compensation.

Specialized Evidence Is Critical

FedEx trucks often have onboard data recorders, sometimes called black boxes, that capture key details such as speed, braking, and steering input in the moments before a crash. These can be critical for proving liability, especially if the driver tries to change their story. But companies are not required to hold this data forever. It takes quick legal action to preserve black box evidence before it is lost or overwritten.

Truck drivers also keep detailed logs of hours worked and breaks taken to comply with <u>federal</u> <u>regulations</u> designed to prevent fatigue. If a FedEx driver skipped rest periods or falsified records to meet delivery targets, these logs can provide powerful proof of negligence.

What to Do After a FedEx Truck Hits Your Car

1. Get Medical Care Immediately

Your health is the priority. Call 911 if there are any injuries. Even if you feel okay, go see a doctor as soon as possible. Many truck accident injuries do not fully show up until hours or days later. Seeing a doctor creates a clear medical record that ties your injuries directly to the accident, which is essential for your claim.

2. Call the Police and Make Sure a Report Is Filed

Never let the truck driver talk you out of calling the police. An <u>official accident report</u> is one of the strongest pieces of evidence you will have.

3. Document Everything You Can at the Scene

If it is safe, take pictures of your vehicle, the FedEx truck, skid marks, damage to guardrails, and any visible injuries. Get the driver's information, including name, license number, and details on the trucking company or subcontractor. If there are witnesses, ask for their names and contact information.

4. Notify Your Insurance Company — But Be Careful

You should report the accident to your own insurer, but keep your comments brief and factual. Do not give a recorded statement without talking to a lawyer. If FedEx's insurance adjuster contacts you, do not answer detailed questions or sign anything. These companies are trained to gather statements that might later be used to reduce your payout.

5. Contact an Experienced Truck Accident Lawyer
