Here's what to do:

1. **Ask for Names and Contact Information** – Get phone numbers, emails, and addresses for anyone who saw the crash.
2. **Take Notes or Record Short Statements** – A quick audio or written note can preserve crucial details.
3. **Capture License Plates of Nearby Vehicles** – If someone stops to check on you, their dashcam may contain key footage.
4. **Tell Police About Potential Witnesses** – They can include the information in their official report.
5. **Contact a Lawyer Immediately** – Our firm can send formal requests and secure recorded statements before memories fade.

Once witnesses move on with their lives, details can blur. Acting fast keeps the evidence intact.
